

Haruka Otsuka

Haruka's parents, Tsuto Otsuka and Niki Otsuka, moved to Vashon from Japan to grow berries^[1]. Before internment, Haruka was born on February 20, 1926 and lived on Vashon Island with her two parents and older brother^[2]. Tokio, her older brother, was 17 in 1940 and just graduated when they left for the camps. Haruka was a sophomore at the same high school. She lived in the Quartermaster precinct and owned a strawberry farm. The family had many hobbies; for example, Tokio played football at the high school while Haruka was a girl scout. Haruka was a part of the tight knit community of Vashon before they were taken to the camps^[8].

The Otsuka family was forcibly removed from Vashon Island on May 16, 1942. They were first taken to Pinedale, an assembly center in Fresno, California, not far from the Fresno Assembly Center. Pinedale was different from the others in that much of its population was from far away, mostly from Washington state and the Seattle area. The Pinedale barracks were about 20 x 100 feet, were divided into even smaller living spaces, and had either concrete or asphalt floors. There was virtually no privacy, including in the shower rooms and latrines^[3]. After Pinedale, the Otsuka's were taken to Tule Lake, California. It was known to be the biggest and most conflict-ridden of the camps and was the last to close. Security at Tule Lake included a battalion of 1,000 military police, tanks, and a "man-proof" fence that was eight feet tall^[4]. The Otsuka family was moved to Heart Mountain, Wyoming (seen above) in October 1943 because of the overcrowding of Tule Lake after the "loyalty questionnaire" forced more people deemed "disloyal" into the camp^[5]. At Heart Mountain they lived in a 740 acre fenced area, wringed with barbed wire and guarded by nine towers. There, the incarcerated grew crops on about 1,100 acres of land^[6]. The Otsuka's were interned from 1942 to 1946, when internment ended. Haruka and Suako's older brother, Tokio Otsuka, served in the military during the war and fought in France^[7].



After internment, the Otsuka family moved back to Vashon where they continued to farm fruits such as strawberries. Their farm was fortunately not destroyed.¹ Haruka Otsuka completed high school in the internment camps. The older brother Tokio continued to farm on Vashon. Her father, Tsuto Otsuka passed away at the age of 72 on January 10, 1948^[9] and Niki Otsuka passed away at the age of 69 on February 17, 1965. Both were buried in Vashon Island Cemetery.

Shirley Suako Otsuka who was the younger of the siblings moved to Seattle around 1952. Here she would marry Terry T. Kameda on October 13, 1962^[10] and work at a bookstore as a bookkeeper in Seattle. She lived near the YWCA which was a group for empowering working women in the Seattle area^[11].

Haruka Otsuka was an experienced dressmaker but primarily worked picking fruits in her parents' fruit farm. She was able to speak in both English and Japanese^[12]. She

married Shigeto G Ishikawa on May 20, 1950 at the age of 24^[13]. She passed away at the age of 77 on October 10, 2004^[14].

The oldest sibling, Tokio Otsuka owned a strawberry farm after serving in the war. After the war he returned to Vashon to farm strawberries. He farmed at Hogsback Farm on Cemetery Road, his parents farm, and Northbourne Farm on Gorsuch Road, his own^[15]. He sold Hogsback Farm in 1996^[16]. He was unfortunately killed on February 3rd, 2005 due to a farming accident.
